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On Our Cover: Thanks to Joan DeMille of Terrytown Garden Club, District II for the photo of the Red Maple Drummond tree, *Acer rubrum* var. *drummondii*. The Drummond or swamp red maple is native to our state. The leaves are light green on the upper side and silvery on the back. As seen in our cover photo, red flowers in clusters mature in late winter to early spring and are an important food source for pollinators. By late Spring female flowers are replaced with pairs of Samara (helicopters) that are about 3/4" long). The tree attracts birds, small mammals and is a larval host for Sphinx Moths.

President's Message



Louisiana Goes Emerald— Plant Wildflowers



It's really hard to believe a year of my Presidency has gone by. I've been able to travel the roads of Louisiana with much pleasure, getting to see my friends, meet new

ones but mostly being able to belong to a great organization as Louisiana Garden Club Federation. I appreciate the warm welcomes from your Club Members at District meetings, functions and celebrations.

Here are a few highlights to celebrate since my term began:

LGCF was fortunate to have completed the following courses: Flower Show School, Course I; Landscape Design School, Course IV; and Environmental School, Course IV. At the completion of ES Course IV, Tommie Andrews, a member of Farmerville Garden Club became a Consultant at the age of 101. She's an inspiration and a rather young Lady at heart. All four schools and a Symposium are scheduled to take place before the end of 2024.

In January, National Garden Clubs announced two LGCF Garden Clubs were recipients of a PLANT AMERICA Community Project Grant. These Clubs are Bulb & Blossom Garden Club (District VII) and Shady Oaks Garden Club (District II). I'm looking forward to seeing their completed projects.

Blue Star Memorial Markers: The BSMM at the National World War II Museum in New Orleans was relocated and rededicated in May. In October, a Marker was dedicated at the Southwest LA Veterans Cemetery in Jennings. In November, a Marker was dedicated at the Southeast LA Veterans Cemetery in Slidell and a Marker placed in Mt. Herman LA. Two more are being scheduled soon.

Tours: LGCF Members have continued racking up traveling miles. In April 2023, Members traveled to 'Holland for the Tulips' at the Keukenhof Gardens in Amsterdam, Brugge Belgium, Gouda and the Van Gogh Museum plus more. Two weeks ago, 34

Members attended the Philadelphia Flower Show, Independence Hall, Amish Country, Longwood Gardens, The Barnes Foundation and enjoyed the famous 'Philly Cheesesteak' sandwich. If you haven't experienced an LGCF Tour, try it out, it's a good time.

Live Oak Society: So far #10,093 Live Oaks have been registered to the Live Oak Society, #311 since I began my term. Two prominent Oaks have been named, #1. "The Paul Soniat Oak", in honor of the Retiring Founder & Director of the Botanical Garden after 41 years of service at City Park in New Orleans. #2. "The Reed J. Perilloux Oak" honored by the Police Jury of Grant Parish for his years of service as a coach, teacher, principal community leader and founder of the Pecan Festival. This honor was presented to him in ceremonies on his 100th birthday. Do you have any OAKS to register in your District?

Cleanest City Contest: In 1958, LGCF began sponsoring a Statewide "Cleanest City Contest." To date, Louisiana is the ONLY member of the National Garden Clubs, Inc. to sponsor such a contest. Anti-Litter Poster Contests are held in Louisiana Public Schools for grades K- 5th to instruct students in litter prevention and awareness. So far, 20 cities have submitted entry forms to compete. District judging will take place April 1-5 and State Judging will take place April 23-May 3rd. Be on the lookout for those Judges!

Last week I attended the **Deep South Garden Club Convention in Gatlinburg TN**. It was enjoyable being with my Sister Presidents from Mississippi, Alabama, Florida, Tennessee and Georgia along with Debby Cooper, Deep South Garden Club Director. Also in attendance was Brenda Moore, National Garden Clubs President. I was able to chat with her for some time discussing current issues being felt by many Clubs and States, membership and having costly conventions. On the final evening at the Awards Banquet, I sat on the stage with my Sister Presidents as we received a food item every time our State won a Deep South Award. You'll be happy to know, LGCF collected a wheel barrel full of food! A good time was held as our very own, **Roxanna Champagne**, Deep South Awards Chairman read out the award winners. Job well done, Roxanna!



Timeless. A century-old collection of delicate, detailed drawings of the natural world from a most unique perspective. A page-turner with few words that illuminates the elemental beauty of creation.

The artist/author, though educated as a physician, abandoned his medical career to devote his life to the study of nature, successfully incorporating his talents in, and love of, art. This

edition, faithfully reproduced from the original, contains 100 of Haeckel's highly detailed plates.

Coming of age on the ground floor of new biological theory, Ernst Haeckel was an apostle of Darwinism and was fascinated by the concept of evolution, expounding his own theories to the point of great controversy.

This one fascinating book represents a small portion of his body of work, and merely contains his illustrations of plants and creatures of all types, but in absorbing the beauty of his observations and study, one can appreciate in a new way the design perfection of the Master of All Creation, the Architect of the Universe.

HIGHLIGHTS OF PHILADELPHIA TOUR

March 3-8, 2024



Twenty-six of the 34 making this tour arrived all together with SW airlines, five from Shreveport, two from Alexandria and one drove in from Maryland! Many of us knew each other, but many of us became friends during the tour. As always, spouses, friends and relatives are always invited to be a part of the LGCF Tours!

In its 195th year, the award-winning PHS Philadelphia Flower Show is a one-of-a-kind marquee event known the globe over for its exquisite and immersive floral exhibits, world-class plant competitions, family-friendly activities, educational offerings, and shopping. Proceeds from the show go to provide "horticultural education" for the schools of Philadelphia. Several of the schools enter exhibits annually. Our first day was spent at the show—what an experience! I think none of us had seen so many exceptional examples of horticulture that were all in one space!! An event worth experiencing!! And what a great dinner at McGillin's Old Ale House (the oldest in Philadelphia) AND the day we went there was voted the "Best Pub in US!"

DAY 2 — Patriot, guided tour of our early history



Beginning before 1776, heard stories of the people, places and things that made Colonial Philadelphia the seat of government for the young nation and one of the largest English-speaking cities in the world. We saw the Liberty Bell, Independence Hall, Congress Hall, First and Second Bank of the US, Betsy Ross House, Franklin's grave, Christ Church, Elfreth's Alley Museum and the neighborhood of Society Hill. Embracing the modern day, we visited

neighborhoods where the Founding Fathers lived and saw how contemporary Philadelphians have made them their own.

Going beyond the colonial period, we explored the bustling business district, Museum Mile of the Benjamin Franklin Parkway, and the famous Rocky steps. We had lunch at *Oh Brothers* to experience the Philly Cheese Steak Sandwich!! Boy, was it good!!!! In the afternoon some returned to the Flower Show and some of us went to Macy's for a wonderfully-beautiful Organ Concert—on the largest organ in the US! Spectacular! We so enjoyed an exciting day in Lancaster County – about 95 minutes from Philadelphia – for an Amish country backroad and 'cottage industry' tour. Several different shops were visited to find cheeses, soap, baked goods,

leather and see the goat farm. We visited Lancaster County's only officially designated *Heritage Site* Amish House. The scenic country setting, surrounded by Amish farms, is but one reason why the Homestead is the only Heritage Site Amish house tour. This prestigious distinction has been earned for its ... **Authenticity** – the "lived-in" look of the house as you walk through nine rooms, including a one-room school ... and its **Interpretation** – Our guide, Dana, answers the 'how and why' questions that baffle visitors (and locals). Why do the Amish dress so plainly? How do they power their appliances? Why don't they have churches? AND we shopped!!! Lunch was a bountiful smorgasbord of traditional and Amish favorite foods. We ended the day with a tour of an Amish Country Homestead & One-Room School. We did eat very well on our tour—and dinner was at the Iron Hill Brewer.

DAY 4 — Trip to Longwood Gardens & Barnes Foundation



Less than an hour's drive from Philadelphia lies the beautiful **Brandywine Valley**, immortalized on canvas by many artists, including the Wyeth family. We visited the world-renowned **Longwood Gardens**. America's premier horticultural center captivates with 1,050 acres of majestic gardens, natural woodlands, and colorful meadows. Twenty spectacular

outdoor gardens awaited us while indoors 4 acres of heated greenhouses contain 20 unique garden settings. We began with a 45-minute guided *highlights tour* of Longwood Gardens. What exquisitely beautiful examples of so many different specimens which were showcased so differently and with so many plants that I would never had displayed together!! We had the opportunity for **free time** to visit the conservatories, outdoor gardens, and gift shop—and to enjoy lunch. I have to say that our tour of *Longwood Gardens* may have been my favorite!!

Later, we visited the *Barnes Foundation* where we had a 30-minute private lecture about the collection prior to free time to explore the galleries and gift shop on our own. Established by Dr. Albert C. Barnes in 1922 to "promote the advancement of education and the appreciation of the fine arts," the Foundation is home to one of the world's largest collections of Impressionist, Post-Impressionist, and early Modern paintings—unsurpassed in breadth, quality, and depth, with extensive holdings by Picasso, Matisse, Czanne, Renoir, and Modigliani. It is enhanced by Greek, Roman, and Egyptian antiquities, Chinese painting, African sculpture, retablos from New Mexico, Native American pottery, and American decorative arts.

The Museum is one of the most interesting, private collections I have ever toured. Well worth a visit. After our trip, it was back to our hotel; then a very special dinner at Positano Coast. We had to say goodbye to our wonderful Guide, Lynn and to Mark, the person with whom I worked very closely to develop this tour.

DAY 5 Very early departure after our fantastic Driver, Petros, took us to the airport. What a wonderful time we ALL had. And we all left as good friends!!


