You will want to see the highlights of the Deep South Convention that many of you attended in March and get a glimpse of next year's convention with the "Save the Date" article.



### The Story of the Katrina Rose The Rose Without a Name

By: Nancy Rust and Carol Stubbs Illustrated By: Melissa Vandiver Crimson Dragon Publishing, Willow AK, 2021 ISBN: 978-1-944644-19-2

Though many of us have heard this true story, and indeed, many may already have a Peggy Martin Rose flourishing in their gardens, this is a tale that needs to be told and retold.

With bright, colorful, original artwork gracing each page, the story about an infamous hurricane's impact on Louisiana in 2005 is introduced to young readers in an inspiring way. Through its straightforward text, the story unfolds about a beautiful, unnamed, "old" rose which ultimately becomes a symbol of survival and hope, a theme of triumph that has been embraced around the world.

Included in this special book are easy-to-read fact pages about hurricanes and roses, followed by information about Peggy Dupuy Martin, as well as the authors and the illustrator.

### **RECEPTION AT GOVENOR'S MANSION**

Prior to the unveiling of the Blue Star Marker, First Lady Elee Reeves hosted a reception at the Mississippi Governor's Mansion. Built in 1842, this Greek Revival style mansion is located just blocks from the Mississippi State Capitol. The mansion is the 2nd oldest continuously occupied gubernatorial residence in the United States. Beautiful gardens cradle the mansion adding to the beauty of the changing seasons making the Governor's Mansion a treasure for the State of Mississippi and a must-see visit spot when in Jackson. The home is a National Historic Landmark.







The Mississippi Legislature granted the DSGC permission to erect the Blue Star Marker on the Capitol grounds. It was erected on the corner facing the Supreme Court building. The opposite corner has the Freedom Trail Marker.....HISTORY, CULTURE.....an amazing location for this marker.

<u>Plant Ahead</u>—Mark your calendars as NGC designates April 2022 as PLANT AMERICA MONTH. - Celebrate Earth Day, April 22, marking the anniversary of the birth of the modern environmental movement which began in 1970, and National Arbor Day on the last Friday in April. - Perhaps you, your garden clubs and families will make some plans to honor our earth and/or <u>plant a tree.</u> No matter your choice, let's keep our country green as we PLANT AMERICA

### **GROW NATIVE!**

Trees alter the environment in which we live by moderating the effects of climate, air pollution, water conservation and by providing wildlife habitat.

What to plant: Select species adapted for growth under local climate and soil conditions. Other considerations are a tree's mature height and shape (proper scale to fit the site and surrounding structures), root spread (small street spaces, cracked sidewalks, paved areas, building foundation, walls), longevity, rate of growth, site requirements: sun or shade and wet or dry site. Species attributes: flowers, fruits (nuts or large fruit in pedestrian areas), seasonal colors and the susceptibility to disease, insects or to storm damage. Select healthiest specimen with the best form.

Where to plant: The site you select will determine your choice of tree, i.e., winter windbreak, summer cooling, sight or sound barrier. Do not plant trees under overhead wires or above underground utilities. Tree branches should be high enough for pedestrians to walk beneath.

How to plant: If at all possible prepare the planting site, a hole 3 times the diameter of the root ball, before you bring in the tree. Cut away and remove wire baskets, strings, burlap, plastic and container. Plant by lifting the well-watered root ball into the planting space. Balance the tree upright on the firm center of the space. Fill to trunk flare and top of root ball at surrounding grade level. Mulch lightly, leaving a bare 3" circle around the trunk. Regularly deep water throughout the first growing season. Avoid injuring the trunk. Stake if necessary.

She received the highest national award for service to the Rose and the American Rose Society— the Gold Honor Medal. She has been awarded her local Society's Bronze Honor Medal and the Gulf District Silver Honor Medal, and was named "Great Rosarian of the World" at ceremonies at New York Botanical Garden in 2009. Back home, she was honored with the YWCA's "Decades of Women in 2017."

She is an advocate for America's Rose Garden at the American Rose Center in Shreveport, Louisiana, where she is leading the "Great Garden Restoration Project"—the total restoration of the gardens. The five-year master plan is underway; the near \$2 million project is expected to be completed by the end of 2022, in time to celebrate the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the gardens. She has the distinction of having a rose named for her – "Marilyn Wellan."

In 2019, the ARS President appointed Marilyn to work with the national Society of the Honor Guard, Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in planning for the commemoration of the Centennial of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. In that capacity, she worked with former Tomb Guards, Chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution, American Rose Society and Louisiana Garden Club Federation members across the state in the creation of Never Forget Gardens. She was instrumental in the creation of the new Never Forget Garden at Veterans Memorial Park at the State Capitol, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, which was dedicated with the Governor and First Lady on Veterans Day, 2021.
