President's Message





Plant Louisiana—Practice Sustainable Gardening

Who knows what the future holds for any of us? A world-wide pandemic never crossed my mind, neither did being president of

LGCF, Inc. I was supposed to give an acceptance speech at the 2021 Convention in Baton Rouge. We all know that did not happen. For the last two years convention committees have spent countless hours and sleepless nights planning a wonderful and informative convention for us. Well, you know the old saying, "If you want to make God laugh, tell him your plans." I believe what many of us learned from the COVID-19 pandemic is that we can never be sure of the outcome of anything. We just plan for the best and have a plan B.

I so enjoyed Linda sharing her life story in her first newsletter report, that I thought I would share my story with you. I am not a Louisiana native; I was born on a cold October's day in Anchorage, Alaska. Later when I was in elementary school and my classmates learned where I was born, they teased me calling me an Eskimo! At the age of three, I was back in Louisiana living in Lockport along Bayou Lafourche. I grew up spending almost all of my summer weekends swimming and skiing in the bayous and lakes surrounding our town. Eating fresh seafood that we caught was one of the delights of growing up surrounded by water. I graduated from Nicholls State University in Thibodaux with a Batchelor's Degree in Education. The summer before I graduated from Nicholls, I married my husband, Earl. After graduation we moved to Columbus, Mississippi for Earl's brief stint in the Air Force. From Mississippi we moved to Lafayette. Three years later after Earl graduated from USL with a petroleum engineering degree we moved to Houma and became oil field trash. My two children, Jonathan and Caroline, were born in Houma. Six years after living in Houma we were transferred to Tyler, Texas. No one could figure out how to spell Champagne, so I soon began saying Champagne like the bottle. Unfortunately, I was in the Bible belt and a dry county, so that did not help much with the spelling. After six years in Tyler, we were transferred down south to Houston. Again, after six years (do you see a pattern here?) we settled in Lafayette, where I have lived for 25 years.

My son is married and has a daughter. He lives in Fulshear, Texas and is a Houston Police Officer. My daughter is married and has five children. She is a pediatrician which is why she has all those kids. She loves children. I spend a considerable amount of time in Lake Charles as there is always someone having a special event or birthday party to celebrate.

Seventeen years ago, when I joined Lafayette Garden Club, I had no idea how my life would change. I never imagined that one day I would be the state president. Believe me, this was not on my Bucket List. I remember the first time it was mentioned that I might one day be state president. I was at Donna Bucci's Installation Reception in 2009, when former LGCF President Bera Smith and JoAnn Blanchard told me that I was going to be the next LGCF president from District III. First a sense of terror gripped me, then I thought there is plenty of time for them to forget. Bera may be gone, but JoAnn remembered. Two years later I found myself as the president of my club, followed by a term as District III Director and I was on my way to the Executive Council. I still clung to the hope that someone would come forward and take this cup away from me, but it was not to be.

The symbol I have chosen is the *Iris nelsonii* or Abbeville Iris. I chose this iris because it is the rarest of the "Louisiana Irises" and can only be found growing naturally in one small swamp near Abbeville, which is in District III. How native can you get? The blooms come in a range of colors from reddish-purple to nearly brown to orange and even yellow. The most incredible aspect of the Abbeville iris is that it is the result of hybridization between not two but three different iris species. It was first described as a species in 1996. Its parentage includes the copper iris (*Iris fulva*), the Dixie iris (*Iris hexagona*) and the zig-zag iris (*Iris brevicaulis*). In order to reduce the possibility of the Abbeville iris becoming extinct, it has been planted in other locations. UL Lafayette now has Abbeville irises planted around Cypress Lake.

I have chosen as my theme: Plant Louisiana—Practice Sustainable Gardening. You may already be using sustainable practices and do not even realize it. Some of these practices are planting the right plant in the right spot, composting, saving and sharing seeds, planting natives, not using herbicides, using natural pest control, planting trees, mulching and conserving water resources.

When I first joined garden club, it was tough to give up my time for club projects, the duties of being a club chairman or officer, state chairman and later state officer. In giving of my time, I received so much more. From attending club, district and state meetings to completing all four NGC Accredited Schools, I have not only increased my knowledge of horticulture, floral design, landscape design and environmental issues, but have made lifelong friendships throughout the state of Louisiana. In my quest for knowledge, I had no idea the benefits I would reap by being a member of LGCF.

I appreciate all of the work that everyone contributes to this organization, without your countless hours of dedication we would not exist. Every contribution no matter how small makes a difference. Each one of you is needed to make LGCF a successful organization, one that we can be proud of. I may be captain of this ship, but without you as my crew I will go nowhere. Let's set our sights on new horizons as we navigate our way through the next two years.




Whether your passion is horticulture, design, photography or landscaping, this is a book you will want to experience!



Overview

Helping members become accomplished horticulturists.

The NGC Gardening School Courses are designed to provide educational information to those especially interested in gardening, horticulture and related subjects.

The School consists of a series of four courses, scheduled usually for two days of instruction, followed by a general examination. Courses cover all aspects of growing, from understanding soil structure to pruning techniques, plant identification, etc. Topics include basic botany, soils, growing annuals, perennials, trees and shrubs, fruits and vegetables, lawns, pests and diseases of plants, plant classification, and selected subjects of local interest.

Additional topics and areas of interest that may be covered are subjects such as Reconciliation Ecology (the science of inventing, establishing, and maintaining new habitats in places where people live, work, and play) and creating backyard habitats to help endangered species such as pollinators and amphibians.

Open to Everyone!

Gardening School courses are open to everyone, regardless of National Garden Club, Inc. membership. Each of the 4 courses has an optional exam. NGC members wishing to apply to be NGC Gardening Consultants must take all four courses and pass each exam.

Non-members fulfilling the above requirements may apply to be Consultants upon joining an NGC affiliated club within one calendar year of the completion date of the 4th course.

GARDEN CLUB MEMBERS Requirements

- Each of the four courses consists of ten hours of lectures, which may include field trips to evaluate and receive instruction on specific course topics.
- Attendance is mandatory at all lectures and field trips.
- Textbook "Botany for Gardeners"
- The student/prospective consultant must take and pass each exam to receive credit.
- Open book/notes for all test questions
- Each Test Question valued at 2.5 points for Course 1 and 2 points for Courses 2, 3, &4.
- A score of 70 is passing.

LGCF Accredited Judges who will take the Symposium for credit must submit their credentials on Form 13, Life Judges use Form 15L and Master Judges who will audit for Good Standing must submit Form 15M no later than 4 weeks prior to scheduled event. Out of State Accredited Judges must mail their credentials to their respective State Credentials Chairman who will forward Form 18 to LGCF Chairman no later than 6 weeks in advance.

Live Oak Society Report—June 2021

As of this writing there are 9,415 Live Oaks registered with the Society. Bravo to all who love their oaks and want to recognize them.

The St. Martinville Garden club began fundraising over a year ago to restore the Evangeline Oak, one of the most popular oaks of the Society. They held raffles and sold acorns from the tree. In May 2021 their biggest fundraiser, "Dinner with Evangeline," was a huge success and the club was able to pay their expenses of the tree's restoration. The Live Oak Society donated \$400 to the very worthy cause.

The Society also donated \$1,000 to LGCF Headquarters to correct damages done in the winter ice storm. Two of the Society's members frame Headquarters from the street.

In early June, Chairman Coleen Perilloux Landry, presented certificate #9385 to

Councilman Joe Giarrusso in the New Orleans' Lakeview area. Named "The Giarrusso Family Oak" it is one of nine trees registered on Harrison Avenue. In an effort to preserve the oaks, the Civic Association of Lakeview, along with all the business owners, are sponsoring registrations and upkeep of the oaks.

A recent article about the Society that appeared in the Baton

Rouge and Acadiana areas brought much publicity and registration

applications are pouring in. The article appeared a week later in New Orleans.

During the Pandemic shutdown the Society registered almost 200 members with people getting into their gardens more and becoming renewed with nature.

The Apple Snail is destroying south Louisiana wetlands at an amazing rate. It has moved in residential canals, golf course lakes, swamps and bayous. Wherever you see a bright pink cluster on a drainage pipe, a tree, foliage, and even fishing boats, you will know the Apple Snail is present. It lays its bright pink eggs in the nighttime and each cluster can have as many as a thousand eggs. The Snail has invaded the rice fields and the crawfish farms of southwest Louisiana, too.



Coleen Perilloux Landry of Acres of Green Garden Club is studying the Apple Snail. The only known predator of the destructive mollusk is the Limpkin, a Florida bird



that is the only bird of its species. For more than a year she has seen the destruction of the snails in the Louisiana swamp and in April discovered two pairs of Limpkins in a swamp in St. Charles Parish. The Limpkins feed 24 hours a day and wherever there is a pile of empty shells she knew the Limpkins had been

eating. Unlike other birds, it has a long, straight beak with a slight tweezers curve on the very end that enables it to get inside the shell and eat the snail. It is not suggested that people consume these snails because they carry a rat lung disease.

Limpkins make their nests on the ground so high water coming in with tidal flow can easily destroy a nest of eggs. However, she is certain that at least one chick survived the May floods. As a wildlife and bird photographer she goes out regularly in search of the Limpkin. It is hoped that quick reproduction can help



destroy the snails, which came to the United States by people emptying fish tanks

into waterways.
