and for their edible seeds. The flowers come in many colors (yellow, red, orange, maroon, brown), but they are commonly bright yellow with brown centers that ripen into heavy heads filled with seeds. Sunflowers make excellent cut flowers, and many attract bees, birds, and butterflies.

Plant Wildflowers



It's hard to believe Fall is here after record breaking 100°+ temperatures in Louisiana with a drought due to prolonged period of below average rainfall, affecting various areas of Louisiana with wildfires,

sugar cane production is down, fewer cattle can graze on a plot of land, less hay is being produced to feed cattle later in the year, impacting wildlife and now causing problems with underground burrows where crawfish live threatening their survival. I don't think there is anyone who will not welcome Fall this year. October should bring some cooler temperatures that will allow us to get out and get some of our overdue gardening projects done.



LGCF-Special Funds

Donations to Special Funds assure financial security for Scholarships, Headquarters, Publications and/or any other special projects of LGCF. Revenues are derived from LGCF Life Memberships, Ways & Means Projects, LGCF sponsored Travel Tours, and individual and club donations.

Money from the fund will be budgeted annually for Scholarships, Headquarters, Publications or any other special program of current need.

All Garden Clubs are urged to contribute annually to the Special Funds and may request their donations go specifically to one of the above. Garden Clubs donating one dollar (\$1.00) per member will receive a Gold Seal Certificate of Recognition; Clubs donating fifty cent (\$.50) per member will receive a Silver Seal Certificate. These certificates will be presented at the annual Convention.

All gifts or bequests to the LGCF over \$250.00 are tax exempt. The donor, upon request, may receive a letter from LGCF Treasurer for tax exemption. (LGCF Hand book-pages 64-65).

These funds can be submitted to LGCF Treasurer using the dues form.

Reminder

When a form is used to submit a payment, it is always advised to go to LGCF Website under Form Library look for the appropriate form as this assures that:

- 1-Funds go to the person responsible for collecting funds.
- 2-Submitting on the most updated form.

Dues

Due to the increase in dues amount the wrong form was submitted to cover the club payments by several clubs.

The dues are due April 1 and delinquent June 1

In early August I am required to submit NGC Dues which has to be done prior to the NGC Fall Board in September that the LGCF President attends.

By early October I will submit any additional dues received to NGC and after that date all dues collected by Clubs would be considered for the following year dues and should be submitted as such.

990-N (e-post card)

This 990-N form is used to submit income on if your income is \$50,000 or less. If your income is greater you are required to use the long form.

This is delinquent after October, 1st

If you fail to submit this requirement for 3 consecutive years you will lose your status and if you need to get back your status you will have to request this to the IRS and there is a cost associated with this.

It is a good idea that all Presidents check to assure that this task is being done by the assigned person.

Blue Star Memorial Markers



Southwest LA Veterans Cemetery Blue Star Marker

Freedom Isn't Free was begun with the intention of installing Blue Star Markers at all military installations in Louisiana. We became aware that there are five Veterans Cemeteries in Louisiana. The first Blue Star Memorial Marker was installed at the Northeast Louisiana Veterans Cemetery in Rayville on May 29, 2017. Mary Hazen, former Blue Star Memorial Chaiman, proposed that Blue Star Markers be installed at the remaining four veterans' cemeteries.

To date, the Southwest Louisiana Veterans Cemetery has installed their marker thanks to the efforts of the Jennings Garden Club and District VII members. The marker has not been dedicated due to the excessive heat of the summer.

Creative Planters Garden Club disbanded in June of 2023, but used the club's funds to purchase a Blue Star Marker for the Southeast Veterans Cemetery in Slidell. That marker has been delivered, but not yet dedicated.

The two remaining veterans' cemeteries that do not have markers are Northwest Louisiana Veterans Cemetery in Keithville and Central Louisiana Veterans Cemetery in Leesville. We have enough funds in the Freedom Isn't Free Fund to one marker. Each marker costs \$1,995.00. Every May the markers increase in price. My goal is to raise the remaining funds before May 2024 so that we may order both Blue Star Memorial Markers.

Did you know that you can honor any veteran or active US Armed Service Member in your family or community by donating to the Freedom Isn't Free Fund while they are still living? A donation in honor of a veteran could be a gift for a birthday, a special event, a holiday or just because. Veterans Day is November 11. Wouldn't it be wonderful to thank them for their service while they are able to accept this honor?

Once we have dedicated Blue Star Memorial Markers at all five Louisiana Veterans Cemeteries, our next goal is to install markers at the two National Veterans Cemeteries in Louisiana. The Louisiana National Cemetery is located in Zachary and the Baton Rouge National Cemetery is located in Baton Rouge.

Please help LGCF achieve the goal of having Blue Star Memorial Markers at all five Louisiana Veterans Cemeteries before May 2024.

GUDELINES FOR MEMORIAL MARKER

I am pleased that clubs are sponsoring Blue Star Markers and then having dedications. However, when ordering and dedicating these markers there is protocol that is sometimes being overlooked.

There are two types of 7'6" markers, **Memorial** and **Highway**.

Memorial Markers are permitted on the grounds of National Cemeteries, Veteran Administration Medical Centers and any other appropriate civic location as approved by the NGC Blue Star Chairman.

Highway Markers are permitted on highways and highway rest areas.

By-way markers are plaques that are permitted in parks, historical sights and other civic locations. The plaques are designed to be mounted on masonry or wood.

The wording on markers has specific rules that must be adhered to. **NO** marker may bear a single person's or family's name. The Blue Star Markers are designed to pay tribute to the **ARMED FORCES AS A WHOLE**. The Gold Star Markers are designed to pay tribute to **THE GOLD STAR FAMILIES AS A WHOLE**.

Under SPONSORED BY, the sponsoring group **must** be an NGC state, region, district or local garden club. Titles of other organizations may be on the marker under IN COOPERATION WITH. "Friends of" is not an organization. It will not be approved by the NGC Blue Star Chairman.

DO NOT SET A DATE FOR THE DEDICATION UNTIL ASSURED THE MARKER WILL


ARRIVE ON TIME. As soon as you have a dedication date, send invitations to NGC President, NGC Blue Star/Gold Star Memorial Chairman, State Blue Star/Gold Star Chairman, State President, District Director, State Executive Board, local garden club members, organizations involved in the project, appropriate city or state officials and veterans' groups. Invitations should include date, time, place, sponsoring group, travel instructions and an RSVP name and address. Allow enough time for busy schedules and travel time.



Kathy taught kindergarten in Ponchatoula for many years. Two members of the Gardenettes garden club who had children in her kindergarten class in 1989, invited her to lunch one day, asking if she would be interested in joining the Gardenettes. At her first meeting, she met the club President Cynthia Oregon, whose husband went to school with Kathy's husband Rolly in Gretna, LA. They became friends, happily connecting through membership in the garden club.

Through her first committee, Garden of the Month, she made many new friends. She recalls that they had to contact The Daily Star and the Ponchatoula Times to meet at the honored home for photos. She became close friends with the photographers Randy Bergeron and Brian McMahon through the years. Randy would aways put her on the spot and ask the name of various flowers in the homeowner's garden. Her husband and artist Rolly helped out by refurbishing the Garden of the Month sign several times for the club. One October, he also designed scarecrows for the Gardenettes to decorate the downtown area for Fall.

While she taught kindergarten at Perrin Early Learning Center in Ponchatoula, the Gardenettes would save their coupons for education to present to her school. Each Spring the Gardenettes would gather at Perrin for a presentation of the coupons. This became a tradition for a good 15+ years.
