#### SUNDAY, MARCH 6

##### WALKING TOUR OF NATCHEZ - 3:00 P.M.

Beginning at The House on Ellicott Hill, one of the properties owned by The Natchez Garden Club, A Walking Tour of Historic Natchez will commence. Tour The House on Ellicott Hill, one of Natchez's oldest homes and where Major Andrew Ellicott raised the first American Flag in the Mississippi Territory. Continuing on from the House on Ellicott Hill learn the history of the James Andrews House, the William Johnson House, and Texada, all with significant history with The Natchez Garden Club.



The tour ends at Magnolia Hall, also owned by The Natchez Garden Club and recently restored with the aid of The Mississippi Department of Archives and History. Magnolia Hall is also known as the Henderson-Britton House and was built in 1858. As a Greek Revival mansion it is on the National Register of Historic Places. Refreshments and a delicious evening meal will be served at this beautiful mansion.

Kathleen Jenkins Bond, Superintendent of the National Park Service in Natchez, will be our Featured Speaker. The National Park Service in Natchez controls the Natchez Visitors Center, Melrose, the William Johnson House, and the Forks of the Road. Kathleen is a history buff who is sure to entertain you with her knowledge of Natchez.



#### TOUR A – 2:00

##### TOUR OF FROGMORE PLANTATION, FROGMORE, LOUISIANA

Historical cotton & plantation culture is the story told at Frogmore Plantation, and there is cotton in the fields to pick from mid-July through April; then planting begins anew. An 1800-acre working cotton plantation, Frogmore has 19 restored antebellum structures that date from the early 1800's. Along with the history of the early Natchez planters and their slaves, the tour includes a rare Smithsonian quality steam cotton gin and then contrasts the historical methods with modern day planting, harvesting, and computerized ginning of cotton.



The tour begins upon arrival and is fully guided through eight historical buildings. Complimentary golf carts are provided for those with special needs. The guides tell of the evolution of change beginning in the 1790's through the war that created the lifestyle called sharecropping.

TOUR B – 3:00 PM

TOUR OF MONMOUTH GARDENS

Monmouth's Gardens were first in the planning stages early in the 1980's and the designs were created by Bill Garbo, noted Mississippi horticulturist, who specializes in the design of gardens in the antebellum period. Harvey Cotton, an early General Manager at Monmouth, was instrumental in the planting and maintenance of the young gardens. Master Gardener, Larry Stewart, was at Monmouth for many years, and was also instrumental in keeping the gardens beautifully well maintained. A complete tour of these beautiful gardens is sure to delight even the most ardent gardeners!

TOUR OF CHOCTAW GARDENS

Owned by Natchez Garden Club Members, David Garner and Lee Glover, Choctaw has been lovingly restored. The Gardens were designed by David and Lee's Good Friend, the renowned P. Allen Smith. Experience the beauty of these gardens with a walking tour of the grounds.

TOUR OF NATCHEZ CITY CEMETERY (LIMIT 30)



A visit to Natchez is not complete without a tour of the Natchez City Cemetery. Established in 1822 on the bluffs high above the Mississippi River, its occupants' stories reveal the history, grandeur, mystery, and tragedy that tell the story of Natchez. The beautiful grounds provide breath-taking views of the Mississippi River – never more beautiful than at sunset. Majestic live oaks shadow the drive into the cemetery leading to the Shelter House, which serves as the main office.

In addition to the wonderful stories associated with the people buried at the Natchez City Cemetery, a tour provides an amazing view of iron fences, benches, tombstones, monuments, and other works of art and master craftsmanship. Talented marble workers such as Edwin Lyon and Robert Rawes are credited with many of the lovely sculpted monuments erected in the antebellum era. Inscriptions on the monuments are often moving, thought-provoking, and insightful. The iron work seen at the Natchez City Cemetery creates a remarkably representative display of 19th and early 20th century ironwork.
